Eulogy for **TIMOTHY KLAUSE**by Brent Klause

My name is Brent Klause, and to those of you who don't know me, I am Tim's cousin. I am also the family lawyer, and supposed to know all the right things to say.

I never thought I would today have the sad honor of delivering a eulogy for Tim, my junior by six years. I saw him last weekend, as usual, working on an old John Deere tractor with Uncle Norm. Tim always had a quick smile, a ready wave and a booming "hello, cousin Brent-Bob."

I hope to get through this without tears. It doesn't do my reputation as a hard nosed prosecutor to be seen in tears in public.

Timothy Erdman George Klause was born on May 8, 1960. We grew up right across the road from each other and he was as much a fixture of the farm as the front gate, which he was always getting too close to.

His older sister, Elrose, and I are only 3 months apart and we were inseparable as children. Tim, his sister, Verna, and my brother, Blair, were the younger siblings. E.J. and I were older and knew we were much more sophisticated - the younger 3 delighted in tormenting us and destroying our personal property.

Tim attended public school in both Saltcoats and Yorkton. After school, he worked on his parents' mixed farming operation and after he finished school, held a variety of jobs at local lumber yards and farmers before his tragic accidental death at Security Lumber in Regina, where he had been employed for the past 2 months.

Tim will not be remembered for any great scholastic accomplishments, nor was he a business or civic leader.

But, there are a great number of things we should all remember about Tim and structure our lives around. Tim wasn't greedy, he wasn't a gossip, he was never rude, seldom angry, and never hurt anyone intentionally. He always had time to stop and say hello.

Tim was eager to help and seldom complained about the tasks to which he was assigned. He was a big boy - you didn't need a fork lift when Tim was around, yet he was also a man who could make an apple pie or curl up with a young kitten or a new calf.

Tim could always turn on the charm with that bright, happy smile, which seldom left his face. He was happy with a Pepsi, large size, and a bag of candy.

I have noticed with interest the reaction of many people when I told them that first, Tim was seriously ill, and later, that he had died. It ranged from sad disbelief to genuine sorrow, and I am continually amazed at the level of affection in which a quiet, unassuming guy like Tim, had been held.

Tim wasn't a mover or a shaker - he wasn't on the fast track, yet his brief life and innate dignity touched the hearts of many.


In John 15, verse 12, Jesus says:

- 12) This is my commandment, That ye love one another, as I have loved you.
- 13) Greater love hath no man that this, that a man lay down his life for his friends...

Tim did not lay down his life voluntarily, but as a result of the donation of his organs, seven people on this planet have been given a chance at a new life.

So, let us leave here today not wondering why our Lord took Tim so early in his life - let us leave here knowing that Tim died an innocent man.

A popular song by Billy Joel is entitled "Only the Good Die Young". Tim was essentially good, and has died young. If more of us can emulate that essence of life that modest Tim lived and breathed during his short life, then that will be absolutely the most moving tribute to his memory, which I will always cherish.



TIMOTHY ERDMAN GEORGE KLAUSE

KLAUSE-Timothy Erdman George Klause, beloved son of Evelyn and Norman Klause of Saltcoats passed away on Thursday, August 23, 1990 at the Plains Health Centre in Regina as a result of injuries suffered in an industrial accident. Tim was born May 8, 1960 in Saltcoats, he was the son of Norman and Evelyn (nee Mantay) Klause. Tim grew up on his parents' farm and received his public school education at Simpson School, attended the Yorkton Comprehensive School, which is now Yorkdale, and completed his high school education at the Yorkton Regional. While Tim was in school he worked at Revelstoke Lumber as a part-time employee and following the completion of his education he joined the staff at Revelstoke as a full-time employee. Tim continued to be active at Revelstoke until some two years ago when he remained at home on the farm helping with the day to day operation of the family farm while his father recuperated from hip surgery. In May of this year, Tim moved to Regina where he gained employment with Security Building Supplies and was presently employed there at the time of his death. Tim was a warm and likeable young man. He had a genuine interest in others and would always be ă willing helper whenever the need arose. He took an active part in the construction of Heritage Baptist Church, loved working with wood, being able to build cabinets and enjoyed doing lathe work. Tim loved the out-of-doors and certainly enjoyed working with the many different animals on the farm. He was an avid collector of farm toys and enjoyed the friendships developed through this hobby. He was also mechanically inclined, derived a great deal of pleasure in the restoring of antique tractors. Tim was predeceased by his grandparents, Edward and Bertha Klause and Gus Mantay. He leaves to mourn his passing and cherish his life his mother and father, Evelyn and Norman Klause of Saltcoats; two sisters, Elrose Klause and her husband, Peter Kinash and their son, Greg of Calgary, Verna Budden and her husband, David and their children, Darla, Skyler and Ethen of Vancouver, B.C.; his grandmother, Mrs. Elsie Mantay of Springside; a cousin-brother, David Smith and his wife, Linda and their children, Kevin and Ashley of Regina; and a number of aunts, uncles and cousins. Funeral services were held Monday August 27, 1990 from Heritage Baptist Church in Yorkton with Pastor Hans Serger officiating. The organist, Valerie Holstein led the congregation in the singing of the hymns, Old Rugged Cross and Amazing Grace. Soloist, Betty Fritzke sang the selections, We Have This Moment, Today and What A Friend We Have In Jesus. Brent Klause delivered the Eulogy. Interment followed in the family plot in the Garden of St. John in the Yorkton Memorial Gardens with Tom and Mildred Lafferty, Mervin and Marjorie Niefer, Wesley and Merle Nabozniak, Art and Irma Jabs, George and Barb Thomas, Leola Sebulski and Ron Carmichael. The active pallbearers were Sidney Mantay, Brent Klause, Blair Klause, David Rosom, Cameron Jabs and Brian Rosenmeyer. Funeral arrangements were entrusted to the Christie Hill Funeral Chapel.

DOROTHY LAURENA RUTH ANDERSON

Dorothy Laurena Ruth was the second child, first daughter, born to Edward and Bertha Klause. Laurena (as she is known to all) was born December 1, 1924. She attended school at Whitesand, Peachview and Saltcoats, graduating with Grade 12. She took several years of piano lessons. From High School, she entered the School of Nursing at Yorkton Queen Victoria Hospital in 1943. She graduated in 1946 as a registered nurse. During her training days, she also learned to sew, knit, crochet and do needle crafts, which she put to good use in the coming years.

After graduation, she continued nursing at her training hospital until 1947, when she married Lauren S.R. Anderson, from 10 miles east of Saltcoats. They had two sons and a daughter, namely:

Raymond John Edward - September 24, 1948 Dwight Douglas - November 7, 1950 Laurian Ruth - May 30, 1955

In 1959, Laurena went back to nursing, firstly in Saltcoats Memorial Hospital, part time. When that hospital closed, she returned to Yorkton at the Union Hospital. Her last 10 years of nursing were spent supervising the volunteers.

In 1976, Lauren and Laurena sold their farm, retaining a section, but renting it out. They retired in Yorkton where Lauren pursued his hobby of woodworking and Laurena did some nursing and was also teaching knitting and crocheting at the Regional College.

During their farming years, they attended a country church, Castleton United Church, and in Yorkton, Westview United. Laurena was a member of Castleton Church Ladies Aid. She was Secretary-Treasurer for many years. Laurena was involved in the 4-H movement during her farming days.





DWIGHT DOUGLAS ANDERSON




- Laura Christina Ruth Bily February 26, 1978




MARY LIVINGSTON (KLAUSE)

Mary was born at Cholm, Poland in 1893, and immigrated to Canada with her parents and three brothers.


